Let's Play; An Exploration of Game Programming— Computer Technologies

Everybody plays them, but what does it really take to make them? We will examine what it takes to develop video games and what makes games popular. We will also learn some basic programming techniques and develop a basic video game you can play at home.

Pixels to Print—Graphic Communications

Magazines, NEWSPAPERS, screen printed shirts, **BILLBOARDS, vehicle graphics, JUNK MAIL . . . See how they are made.**

Each student will participate in a digital photography contest, design graphics for a race car, screen print a shirt, and design and print a large poster.

Be Careful Where You Step—Landscaping & Horticulture

A wonderful place for you to be if you like the beauty of the outdoors. Participants will gain knowledge of their horticulture surroundings. Learn how to prepare the soil and design gardens. Upon camp completion, participants will have created various plant displays such as window boxes, dish gardens, herb gardens to take home.

Go Live on the Internet!—Marketing

Learn basic HTML to create a web site. HTML is one of the most important elements in web page design. This camp will provide participants with the ability to add background colors, change text size, change fonts, add pictures, links, and horizontal lines. Tripod will be used to publish the web site.

Exploring Technologies & Tradition—

Building Trades Construction

This camp will introduce students to the latest technologies used in the construction industry today. The students will construct and build projects using skills of **masonry, plumbing and carpentry.**

Charge It —Electrical Occupations

Students will gain a better understanding of how electricity works, examine how electricity is produced, and how hydrogen fuel cells operate. Projects will include wiring a door bell, building a solar powered car, building a self generated flashlight, making extension cords, and building circuit boards.

How Things Work—Heating, Ventilation & Air Conditioning (HVAC)

Learn how refrigerators, air-conditioning, electricity and water work together to make your life easier. Enjoy hands-on activities related to the trade.

Health & Human Services Academy

Nurses Have A “Leg Up” on Fun!—Allied Health

Explore the world of Nursing. Prepare your own first aide kit. Listen to heart sounds. Learn hand washing techniques through the use of glow worm. Experience life through the eyes of an older adult with sensory stimulation.

Sharper Image—Cosmetology

Explore fun ways to improve self-image. Students will learn ways to look and feel their best by developing skills in manicures, pedicures, facials and scalp treatments. This interactive environment will allow them to not only feel good and look good, but to bring out the best in others too!

Animals, Animals, Animals Everywhere—Veterinary

Are you interested in someday making a living working with animals? If you have a love of animals, there are many careers out there that involve small animal care. You could be a Veterinarian, Vet Assistant, Pet Store Owner, Groomer or Kennel Operator. Come to this camp to learn more about what it takes to properly care for small animals. This first year camp will offer hands on activities as well as visits from professionals in animal care and possibly a trip to the local Humane Society. The Franklin County Career and Technology Center is planning on offering a Vet Tech Program starting with the 2008-2009 school year—so don't miss out.

Production Academy

Classic Design and Engineering—Drafting & Pre-Engineering

Learn how to create detailed and precise engineering drawings with the use of drafting boards and 3-D Modeling Computer Programs. Build your own Puzzle Cube following the drawing specifications of your design. Use engineering tools and techniques to create a drawing of an item, thereby understanding how it is assembled and built.

Mindstorm Robots—Electronics

Campers will experiment with Lego Mindstorm's Robotics Invention System. Learn to build and program a variety of robots that can sense light, sound and touch. Write your own programs to make them do what you want. (*Maybe put your clothes away or make your bed.*) Also learn to solder components on printed circuit boards and build your own robot kit to take home.

Machine Dreams: Engineering and Machining—Machine Shop

Blend the creative design process with realistic problem-solving activities by exploring the processes of manufacturing machined parts, planning machining, measuring, heat treating and testing. Become familiar with the basics of the lathe, milling machine and machine operations. Instructor mixes lecture with live demonstrations and practical applications. Upon camp completion, participants will make a product.
